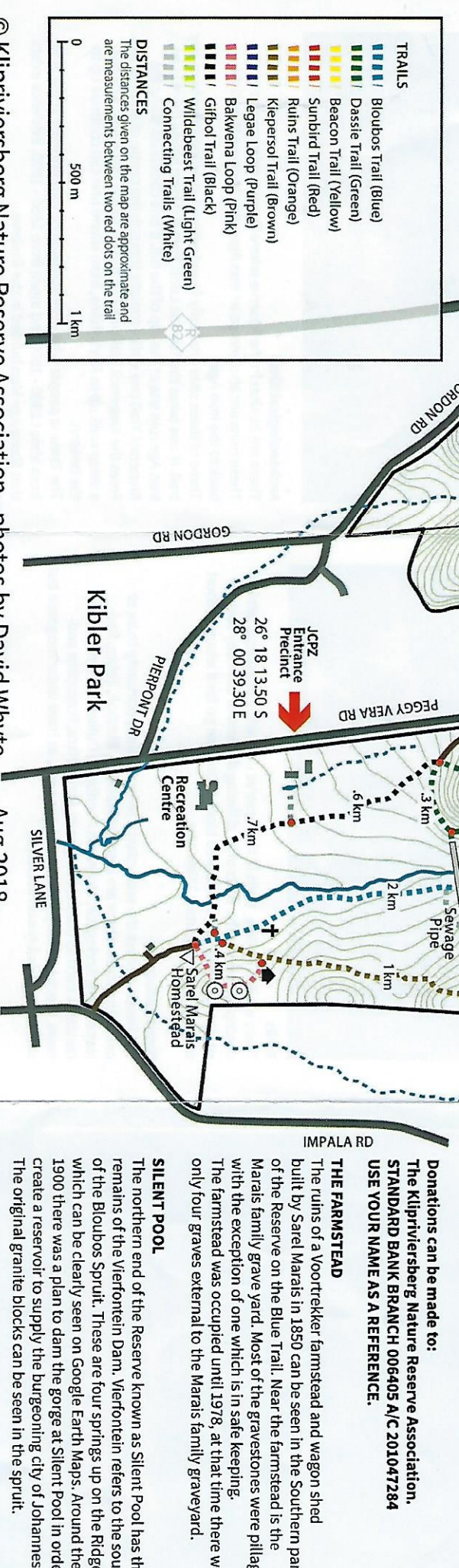

THE FARMSTEAD
The ruins of a Voortrekker farmstead and wagon shed built by Sarel Marais in 1850 can be seen in the Southern part of the Reserve on the Blue Trail. Near the farmstead is the Marais family grave yard. Most of the gravestones were pillaged with the exception of one which is in safe keeping. The farmstead was occupied until 1978, at that time there were only four graves external to the Marais family graveyard.

SILENT POOL
The northern end of the Reserve known as Silent Pool has the remains of the Vierfontein Dam. Vierfontein refers to the sources of the Blouboos Spruit. These are four springs up on the Ridgeway which can be clearly seen on Google Earth Maps. Around the year 1900 there was a plan to dam the gorge at Silent Pool in order to create a reservoir to supply the burgeoning city of Johannesburg. The original granite blocks can be seen in the spruit.
